If you received a new eReader, smartphone, or tablet this holiday season, you should know that your library will be a fantastic resource once the wrapping paper has come off.

We here at the Garfield County Libraries realize that these are very fun, very powerful devices. We have the content you want, along with the staff and programs to familiarize you with how to use our services on your new device.

For example, if you received a new Kindle, Nook, or other eReader, we have eBooks available for checkout through our OverDrive database. You just need a Garfield County library card number to get started. OverDrive has a Help menu that will take you to instructions (which are specific to your device) on how to download a book. In January, the Gordon Cooper, New Castle, and Rifle Branch Libraries will be hosting programs specifically designed to help anyone learn how to do this. There are also friendly, helpful staff members throughout the county who can assist you if you call or come in.



If you got a smartphone or tablet for Christmas, you'll also find the library to be a great source of content and help. You still have access to OverDrive and all the items mentioned above. Plus, smartphones and tablets such as the iPad have apps specifically designed to make it quick and easy to download and read eBooks on the go.

From a tablet you will also have full internet capabilities and can access the Garfield County Library website, www.gcpld.org. There you can renew books, check out the events calendar, and explore our incredible databases available. Young children will enjoy watching and listening to books with the Tumblebooks database, anyone wanting to learn a new language can access Mango Languages, and those who need auto repair help can take advantage of our subscription to Chilton's online database. The libraries also offer free Wi-Fi so you can go online with your device, even if you don't have a monthly connection plan.

If you are a smartphone user, you can download our brand new app GCPLD 2 Go which has many features of our website in an easy-to-use mobile form.

Have fun playing with your new tech toys. And remember, the libraries are here with great eBooks and help if you need it.

Judy Martens Retires After 30 Years

Judy continually learns new techniques and embraces new technologies, and for seven of her years with the libraries she was also the webmaster for the Library District.

New Castle Library Opens April 14th

The New Castle Branch Library will reopen on April 14th with a Grand Re-Opening Ceremony that will start at 10 am. Join us for refreshments and giveaways that day until 2 pm. The new library will feature a beautiful new fireplace and reading area, local history room, teen area, interactive children's area and new community meeting room. The new library is being designed by Michael Hassig and Brad Zeigel of A4

Architects and is being built by B&H Construction.

The Silt Branch Library will

break ground in March 2012 and will open late in 2012. The architect is Paul Tremontozzi of Oz Architecture and the contractor is FCI. The

building features an expandable meeting room to accommodate larger events, as well as two study rooms, unique children's and teen spaces, and a plaza between the existing Silt Town Hall and the new library. The plaza will feature 28 concrete "books."

Donors will have an opportunity to name their favorite title and author as part of the installation. Contact Kelsy Been for more information.

The new library in Glenwood Springs at the corner of Cooper Avenue and Eighth Street is wrapping up design development with architect Dennis Humphries of Humphries Polis Architecture and FCI performing the construction. The new library will have a parking structure underneath, and a second floor above owned by Colorado Mountain College (CMC). A second parking structure will be

constructed at the corner of 9th and Cooper by the Glenwood Springs Downtown Development Authority and the City of Glenwood Springs. The project calls for a new 14,000 square foot library on the ground floor, a community plaza, and a second floor that will be unfinished, providing future expansion space for the library and CMC. The library will feature terrific children's and teen areas, a quiet reading room with a fireplace, four study rooms and a large community meeting room. The project is slated to break ground in April 2012.

The District hired Willis Pember Architects and Humpries Poli Architecture to design the new library for Carbondale. Currently the project is in design

Book Recommendations from Staff Members



The Magicians

by Lev Grossman

The Magicians is the coming-of-age story of Quentin Coldwater, a self-described nerd who, as a high school senior, is still obsessed with the magical world described in his favorite childhood books. Quentin unexpectedly finds himself at a mysterious college where he discovers that magic is real and there is more to the world than meets the eye.

Since its release, I've been recommending *The Magicians* to anyone who will listen, describing it as "Harry Potter for grown-ups." Really, though, it's more complex than that. The story is appealing on many different levels, whether you are hooked by the fascinating plotline, the multi-dimensional characters, or the imaginative settings. There are obvious parallels to J. K. Rowling's Harry Potter series and C. S. Lewis' Narnia stories and hints of J. R. R. Tolkien's Middle Earth, L. Frank Baum's *Oz*, and even Madeleine L'Engle's *A Wrinkle in Time*. But, I found Grossman's voice to stand apart as smart and very funny. While the influence of those earlier authors was clearly apparent, I often felt that Grossman was not giving a nod to those authors so much as he was giving the reader a cheeky (and sometimes snarky) wink. I highly recommend *The Magicians*, even if you don't usually read in the fantasy genre.

Bellwether

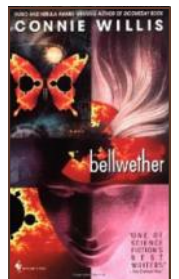
by Connie Willis

This is a science fiction book for people who might think they don't like sci-fi. While Willis is the winner of many notable science fiction awards, including eleven Hugo Awards and seven Nebula Awards, this book reads like a romantic comedy. Connie is a Colorado author, and this endearing, charming novel takes place in Boulder.

The main character, Sandra Foster, is a scientist in Research and Development at HiTek, a fictional research company. Sandra is plagued by an incompetent, insufferable office assistant named Flip who misdelivers packages, throws months of research in the garbage, and generally causes trouble wherever she goes.

Due to Flip delivering an important package to the wrong office, Sandra meets Dr. O'Reilly, a mysteriously geeky yet charming fellow scientist at HiTek. Dr. O'Reilly is studying information transfer in animals, and his experiment is nearly a complete loss when Flip loses his funding request form. Will Dr. O'Reilly lose his job? Will Dr. O'Reilly and Sandra end up together? Find out in the pages of this charming, funny novel that happens to take place in the world of Science.

development, and we have hosted two community meetings with a third scheduled for January 12th. Special emphasis will be placed on engaging community artisans to contribute to the project.

The new library will be a 13,000 square foot facility at the corner of Sopris and Third Avenue. We hope to break ground by next summer, with a completion date of mid-2013. Currently the project includes an outdoor reading patio, three study rooms, a joint community room/quiet reading area, and special children's area. The Mount Sopris Historical Society is exploring the possibility of creating a time capsule as part of the project. Watch their web site for more information at www.mtsoprishistoricalsociety.org. The project will be bid out for construction in the late spring.

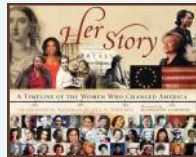

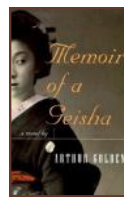

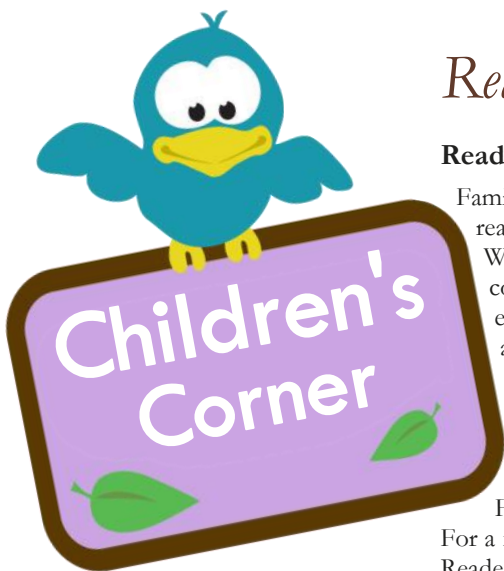

The traveling exhibit will be in Rifle from mid-June to mid-August. The library will also be presenting events in conjunction with the exhibit so watch out for more info in the coming months.



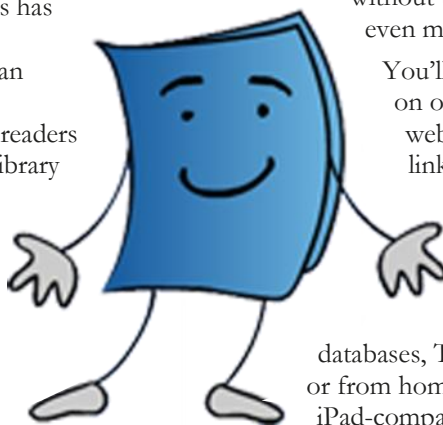
This Quiz Game is just one of the many interactive pieces in the exhibit.



Database Spotlight

TumbleBooks are now iCompatible!

TumbleBooks is one of Garfield County Libraries' free electronic resources available on our website. TumbleBooks has hundreds of animated books, complete with voice-overs and music, that you and your child can read along with. This is a fun way to get tiny tots interested in stories and a great tool to help new readers improve their reading skills. The TumbleBook Library includes Story Books for younger kids and TumbleReadables for older kids. Most titles include information on appropriate grade level to help you find a story that's just challenging enough for your young reader. You and your child can browse through subjects like holidays, sports, and adventure, or check out the list of New Books. It's a fun activity to do together, especially on a cold winter day!



through TumbleBooks and TumbleReadables. But now the fine folks at TumbleBooks have produced a selection of titles without the use of Flash, and they're working on even more.

You'll find TumbleBooks and TumbleReadables on our Kids' Fun Stuff page: browse to our website at www.gcpld.org, click on the "Kids" link near the top of any page, then click on the frog. The TumbleBook Library also includes educational games, books in Spanish and French, and the ability to navigate the site in other languages such as Spanish. Like most of the library's databases, TumbleBooks can be accessed at the library or from home with your library card number. To find iPad-compatible titles, click on the red "Story Books" button on the TumbleBooks home page, then click on the green "iPad Books" button near the center at the top of the page. You may also use the TumbleSearch feature to search for "iPad." Whatever type of device you use, we hope you enjoy TumbleBooks and TumbleReadables. Happy Tumbling!
